Teaching experience (*Courses created)

The University of Missouri – St. Louis

English Composition: Department of English (Asynchronous)

This course focuses on writing and illiteracies in various contexts. Builds on intellectual maturity, knowledge, and abilities gained through prior university studies. Enhances analytical, communicative, persuasive, and explanatory capabilities. Includes complex readings and research.

African & African Diaspora Studies: Department of History

I enhanced existing curriculum for this CORE course, designed for students pursuing a certificate in African Diaspora Studies. This course introduces students to the diverse discipline of African & African American Studies (aka Africana Studies or Black Studies), the interdisciplinary field of study dedicated to exploring the history, politics, religions, culture, and social movements of Africans in America and throughout the diaspora.

Writing the City: I enhanced existing curriculum of this junior level composition course by adding units on Cahokia Mounds and African American St. Louis History.

Allies, Spies and Secret Friends *

This examined how allyship has shaped the lives of important figures throughout history over space and time. Who helped Phillis Wheatley publish her book and cement her legacy as the first African American woman to publish a collection of poetry? How did a printing press aid the abolitionist movement? Who were the Freedom Riders? Who were some of the secret friends behind the scenes? These, and other questions are addressed as we learn how members of the White community have laid their lives and livelihoods on the line for Black Americans.

Rhyme & Reason: African American Poets in Dialogue with Notions of Slavery, Identity, & Existence * This survey course examines African American poetic tradition from its beginnings in the 1700s to the present. This course explores, through poetry, the lived experiences of enslaved African Americans, whose works are read in dialogue with contemporary African American poets who write about issues relating to slavery. This survey course examines poetry from Phillis Wheatley, Jupiter Hammon, George Moses Horton and others who were enslaved and their works are compared with contemporary writers such as Derek Wolcott, Rita Dove, Jericho Brown, and others. In addition to analytical essays, students will also write their own poetry centered in their lived experiences with identity and the complexities therein.

Independent study: Supervised Student Research

Over the course of three years, I supervised student independent research and encouraged student participation in the Undergraduate Research Symposium.

Independent study: Honors Portfolio Writing (Hybrid)

Over the course of three years, I supervised student professional development interview preparation, e-portfolio as well as resume development.

Introduction to Women's and Gender Studies: Lecturer

This core class introduces students to cultural, political and historical issues that shape gender. Through a variety of disciplinary perspectives in the humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences, the course familiarizes students with diverse female and male experiences and gendered power relationships.

Introduction to Feminist and Gender Theory: Lecturer

This course serves as an initial intellectual investigation into gendered ideologies (such as the effects of race, ethnicity, nationality, socioeconomic class, sexuality, and religion) and functions as a bridge to later advanced gender theory and methods courses. Topics included interdisciplinary feminist theories (with a focus on gender equality), including masculinity theory, queer theory, muted group theory, and other evolving frameworks.

Special Topics in Gender Studies: African American History

This course selectively surveyed the experiences of African Americans from the period of the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade to the late twentieth century. Among the topics covered: the development of the slave trade and the institutionalization of slavery, slave culture and resistance, the role of African Americans during the Civil War and Reconstruction period.

Harris-Stowe State University (Summer Bridge & Trio Academy)

English Composition & other ideas *

This seminar style survey course is designed to offer high school students the rigor of the college classroom while also helping them understand the complexity and use of English as a mode of communication. Students can expect to learn how to craft an email to professors, develop their own writing process, understand the value of peer review, rhetoric, and the basic mechanics of grammar and citation methods.

English Composition: Emphasizes the process of writing effectively for a variety of audiences and purposes.

Advanced Composition: Builds upon the skills developed in English Composition I and focuses primarily upon the process of writing with sources.

American Literature Beginnings to 1865 I: This survey course examines American literature from its pre-colonial beginnings through the Civil War.

American Literature 1865 to the present II: This survey course is designed to cover the texts of the major authors in American literature from 1865 until the present day.

Introduction to Literature: Involved reading and writing about literature from around the world with an emphasis on literary elements and reader responses.

Modern English Grammar: Employs a seminar setting with student recitation and problem solving and includes three moderate exams to assess students on knowledge of useful paradigms.

Themes & Topics in British Literature: In the course students examined important aspects of British literature.

Current Research Projects

Poetry in community – paper forthcoming

In connection with [Home #30](#), by Al Loving, that is currently on loan at the Saint Louis Art Museum, I wrote seven ekphrastic poems. The poetry is intended to uplift residents in the Saint Louis community after experiencing a tornado on May 16th. On Nov. 2, as part of *Art on the Move*, I wrote, shared, and lead teaching demonstrations with members of the community. Those poems are currently on display at the Education Gallery at the Saint Louis Art Museum.

Across the water – course in progress

In collaboration with my colleague Dr. Deneia Y. Fairweather (Johns Hopkins University), we are developing curriculum to aid in repairing cultural dissonance within the African Diaspora, caused by coloniality within existing educational curricula. Our course will examine how continental Africans, Afro-Caribbeans, Afro Brazilians and African-Americans experience the legacy of colonization. Lastly, our course will address how that dissonance creates cultural barriers within the African Diasporic communities.

The Guerrero Project Homeward Bound – paper in progress

I participated in the joint effort of retelling the historic narrative of the Guerrero Slave shipwreck that occurred off the Florida Coast on December 19, 1827, carrying over 561 captive Africans to Cuba. Through a series of interviews, a symposium and filming in Liberia, West Africa from

December 3-15, 2024, I gathered qualitative data from living descendants. My data will contribute to the development of my new course “Across the water”.

Retaining Colored students at the University of the Western Cape – paper in progress
 In March of 2024, as the recipient of University of Missouri South Africa Educators Fellowship, I collected qualitative data from students who identify as Colored in a post-Apartheid South Africa. The data will be used to compare how students in Cape Town, South Africa absolve lasting legacies of oppression while obtaining a college education.
